Here's everything you need to know about the current system, how the exams were judged this year and how to complain. How are students rated this summer? What are the centre estimates (CAG)? Ofqual - the government's regulator for qualifications, exams and tests in England - asked schools and colleges to use their professional experience to make a fair and objective assessment of the assessment they believed a student would achieve if they passed exams. They're called CAG. What are class orders? After deciding on the most likely CAG for their students, schools and colleges then created an order of pupils within each class for each subject. For example, all pupils of grade 5 GCSE maths would be ranked from highest to lowest – where student 1 is safest in this class, pupil 2 next safest, and so on. This included both senior and core students. How were cags approved in schools and colleges? Before coming to the examination committees, two subjects were used by all classes and the order; One is the head of the department. On the basis of this standardisation, individual grades could be negotiated up or down, which means that the assessment awarded to a student could be different from that sent by their school or college to the examination committees. What grade did I get on the day of the results? After the U-turn, NA-level students and GCSE received their (CAG) as the final result if it is higher than their calculated estimate. If they find the data used to standardize estimates unreliable to predict results in that year, or there has been an administrative error in cag or order data, such as mixing two pupils with similar names or mistakenly copying for incorrect information, schools may file a complaint. However, they cannot complain against the CAG that they decided it was correct when they submitted it to the examination board and for which the headteacher submitted a statement confirming that this was the assessment most likely to have been received by the pupils. Can students appeal to grades? Even now that the grades have changed back to those predicted by your teacher, it is still possible to appeal to your grades. You can ask your school to check the result (this is called a required review) or you can ask your school to appeal to Ofqual. Students cannot complain, but they may wonder if they have made an administrative error. If the schools agree, they can appeal to the exam board on behalf of the pupil. What to do if you have concerns about sufficiency or discrimination? If students have concerns about their case, discrimination or any other factor indicating that the school or college has not behaved with care or care when determining results, they should first take those concerns with their centre. Students can then pass on their concerns to the relevant exam board if they have first applied a complaint policy to schools or colleges and they must feel that there is evidence of statehood against the case at the time. If there is evidence, Ofqual requires the exam boards to consider allegations such as possible maladminist misconduct or maladminist misconduct. Technically, that's not a complaint. Can students complain about the elusive results? No. The decision to give students a higher CAG or their calculated grades means that an appeal based on your light exams is not available, as the results were elusive part of the evidence of the school and the centres that were considered in determining the CAG for their students. If you are unhappy with the results, the good news is that you can sit down for the autumn exams. Those who opt for exams in the autumn also won't have to worry about getting lower than what they received this summer, as the highest score of these two will be the final score. If necessary, exam boards will issue replacement certificates for summer results and the results will be based only on the performance of students in exams and not on any non-exam grades. This is with the exception of artistic and design qualifications for which there are no exams. Who can sit in the 2020 autumn exam series? Any student enrolled in GCSEs, AS and A-level exams that were designed to go ahead this summer can sit down as an autumn exam series. Those who believe the exam board has made a compelling case about their intention to enroll in the summer series will also have the opportunity to sit on exams in the autumn. Who else should take the exams in the fall? There will be a small group of pupils whose grades could not be calculated this summer and it is particularly important that these students are able to sit exams in autumn 2020. For example, private candidates: home students, self-taught pupils or students who were expected to re-take exams this summer were also part of last year's cohort of pupils. How do I enter the 2020 autumn exam series? You'll already have an entrance to autumn exams if the school has enrolled you in exams this summer. If you want to take part in the autumn exams, you need to call your center and tell them that they will be able to factor in the performance. Where are the students going to sit for exams in the fall? You're going to take the exam wherever you were meant to be. That way, university students, for example, will have to return and sit at school or college. What are the dates of the 2020 autumn exam series? AS and A-level exams will be between 5 and 23 October on 23 October and GSSE will take place between 2 and 23 and will sit exams for free November.Is the autumn?
